



Michigan Department of Education's Vision

- Develop, support, and sustain a high-quality, prepared, and collaborative education workforce.








putting Michigan on the map as a premier education state






Percent change in School Librarians between 2003-2004 and 2013-2014

Understanding Individualized Reading Improvement Plan (IRIP) Terms

- Phonemic awareness- the ability to hear and distinguish sounds
- Phonics the ability to understand the relationship between letters and the sounds they represent
- Fluency the ability to read with sufficient speed, accuracy, and expression to support understanding
- Comprehension the ability to understand and draw meaning from the text
- Vocabulary the student's knowledge of, and memory for, word meanings



Literacy Essentials
















Let's compare ECRR to the Essentials:



- Talk and ask question as about the book as you read together
- **Sing** and use rhymes with children
- Read books aloud and point out text everywhere you go
- Write stories, draw, and trace letters with your child
- Play using puppets or objects to retell a story




- 1. Intentional use of literacy artifacts in dramatic play and throughout the classroom.
- 2. Read aloud with reference to print.
- 3. Interactive read aloud with a comprehension and vocabulary focus.
- 4. Play with sounds inside words.
- 5. Brief, clear, explicit instruction in letter names, the sound(s) associated with the letters, and how letters are shaped and formed.
- 6. Interactions around writing.
- 7. Extended conversation.
- 8. Provision of abundant reading material in the classroom.
- 9. Ongoing observation and assessment of children's language and literacy development chat informs their education.
- 10. Collaboration with families in promoting literacy.












- Trek's Travels feature narration and word-by-word highlighting.
- Welcome to Reading provides leveled reading practice to develop reading skills and incorporates The Lexile Framework For Reading.










- Play features a collection of educational games that complement the stories and topics featured in Early World of Learning.
- Classics hosts the "Story Corner," "Nursery Rhymes," and "Songs" sections designed for the very young learner, great for storytime or at home use.








- Early World of Learning offers children access to more than 230 videos that correspond with the different themes found within the database.
- These videos build upon core background knowledge by incorporating real-world examples of themes, topics, and objects found within the *Read* section.














You put on a **coat** before you go outside when the weather is cold or rainy.

A coat that is meant especially for the rain is called a raincoat.

Animals have **coats** too. The fur that covers an animal's body and keeps it warm is its **coat**. The difference is that an animal can't take its **coat** off when it comes inside!

A wall can have a \mathbf{coat} too — a \mathbf{coat} of paint, that is. A thin layer of something like dirt or frost can also be called a \mathbf{coat} or $\mathbf{coating}$.




